Title I Schoolwide Program Overview

Schoolwide Plan

School staff implements the district approved, evidence-based curricula that are aligned with Alaska Content Standards. School community advocate will communicate with and support families and students to decrease chronic absenteeism with the help of Indian Ed funding. The community advocate will make telephone and face-to-face contact with students and parents to decrease chronic absenteeism. Indian Ed funding will also be used to hire two certified teachers for after school tutoring throughout the year. Eek school will also utilize Title 1 funding to hire one certified teacher for after school tutoring. Additionally, with the use of Title 1 funding, Eek School will hire a teacher aide III to help struggling kids in the classrooms.

B. Describe the strategies that the school will use to provide opportunities for all children, including each of the subgroups of students, to meet the challenging State academic standards.

School staff systematically use a review process to determine if the curricula address the learning needs of all students. Eek school has established an RTI/MTSS/SEL committee to discuss kids in need of additional attention and strategies to help teachers deliver needed instruction or support.

Describe how the school will use methods and instructional strategies that strengthen the academic program in the school, increase the amount and quality of learning time, and help provide an enriched and accelerated curriculum, which may include programs, activities, and courses necessary to provide a well-rounded education.

School staff use evidence-based instructional practices, programs, and materials. School staff create and implement schoolwide operational procedures that minimize disruptions to instructional time. Eek school will hire additional teacher aides through Title 1 funds and general budget funds to help teachers in the classroom to deliver instructional strategies and content. Additionally, teachers will be trained to deliver new and innovative teaching strategies and best practices in the classroom through engaging in-services and professional development time.

D. Describe how the school will address the needs of those at risk of not meeting the challenging State academic standards.

School staff implement a coherent documented plan throughout the school to ensure that all students receive core instruction, and all low-performing students receive additional support to meet their needs and reach proficiency. Additionally, Eek school has created a committee of teachers, principal, and our special education teacher to discuss concerns of students who are struggling either emotionally or academically. During these meetings, information gathered is recorded in PowerSchool and suggestions on course of action are provided to teacher as well as any additional support through either teacher aides or supplementary material.
